Peer Effects in Labor Supply (job market paper, single-authored)

Abstract: This study investigates peer effects in labor supply. Using a representative longitudinal survey of US adolescents which includes data on friendships and combining a difference-in-differences and instrumental variables approach, I provide a causal estimate of the effect of peer labor supply on individual labor supply. I find a significant social multiplier of approximately 1.07, and provide evidence that peer effects are due to social norm compliance rather than information transmission mechanisms. Further analyses suggest that the behavior of higher socioeconomic status individuals produces larger labor supply externalities.

Changing Gender Norms: The Impact of Paternity Leave on the Next Generation
with Lidia Farré, Christina Felfe, and Libertad González

Abstract: Traditional norms about gender roles are one of the remaining barriers to gender equality. We ask to which extent counter-stereotypical behaviors among parents shape gender norms for their children. To that end, we combine the introduction of paternity leave in Spain with a large-scale lab-in-the-field experiment conducted with children born around the reform. We show that children whose fathers were eligible for paternity leave exhibit more egalitarian gender role attitudes and perceive less stereotypical social norms towards working mothers and fathers. They also engage more in counter-stereotypical day-to-day behaviors and expect to deviate from the male-breadwinner model in the future.

The youth mental health crisis during the COVID-19 pandemic: A natural experiment on the role of school closures

Abstract: The youth mental health crisis has become so acute during the COVID-19 pandemic that a coalition of U.S. pediatric health experts has declared it a national emergency. To which extent the different pandemic measures have contributed or even caused this emergency is largely unknown. School closures are among the most heavily debated pandemic measures, with insufficient evidence on their costs. We seek to narrow this blind spot, by compiling novel data on the various school closure and re-opening strategies implemented by federal states for the different grade levels and school tracks of Germany at the onset of the pandemic and combining it with data from a nationwide, population-based, longitudinal survey on mental youth health and the largest crisis helpline for children and adolescents. Using this quasi-experimental variation, we show that prolonged school closures led to a significant deterioration in youth health-related quality of life, precipitating first signs of mental health problems. Effects were most severe among boys, younger adolescents, and families with limited living space. Young people also increasingly sought support from crisis helplines to discuss arising family and friendship problems. Importantly, the effects persist even when abstracting from the overall strain imposed by the pandemic or further pandemic measures. Indeed, school closures explain around two thirds of the aggravation of the youth mental health crisis throughout the first pandemic wave and there is no sign for a swift recovery.
